## "TEN CHARLIES" KNOW ALL ABOUT THE BIRDS AND THE BEES

They know the birds, (and mice), are under the cowlings and the bees are in the pitots! Some considerations: Tightly cowled engines are hard to inspect. Take some tin off and have a really good look. Be alert for tell tale signs -- droppings and pieces of nesting material. Birds love the vertical stabilizers of Cessnas. Have one of the guys in the shop show you where they get in and how to stop them. They'll also nest in wings, tail cones, wheel wells, etc. Nests can block cooling air flow and ruin an engine. Nests hold moisture and urine and mouse and bird droppings cause rapid corrosion in either aluminum or steel. They may also jamb cables or mechanical linkages.

Watch out for stinging insects -- one in the cabin, or a nest in the airframe. This could be as bad as a fire in flight to an allergic pilot or passenger!

If you've never had a blocked pitot tube, some day you probably will. Think it through before it happens. Is it that big of a deal? Is a high speed abort on a short runway really necessary? If you get airborne without an airspeed indication, it's not the end of the world -- you know about what speed a given power setting will yield at various rates of climb and descent and in cruise. You're not going to make a short field landing, now -- go some place with a nice long runway and land a little hot. And now that you're on the ground, don't stick a piece of wire in the pitot or dismantle the wing. It comes apart easily. If you've never been shown, ask. Try a little flight with the airspeed covered briefly and see how close you can guess your speed -- If you've got a lot of time in your bird, you'll be surprised at how good you can do.

Now that their homes are out of your plane, keep your plane out of their homes -- be careful on grass -- a wheel in a burrow can put you out of business, too!
